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We are graduate students in the Department of Fishery and Wildlife Sciences at New Mexico State University, researching threatened and endangered fishes. We were also previously employed as fishery biologists by the U.S. Geological Survey, studying threatened and endangered species. We are residents of New Mexico. We are also recreational users of the Apache and Gila national forests. I (Ryan) conducted part of the research for my Master of Science in the Aldo Leopold Wilderness.

We strongly feel that one of the greatest assets possessed by the United States, especially in the western states, is the massive amount of public land available for recreational activities. We also strongly feel that one of the greatest laws passed by the United States is the Endangered Species Act. However, we pessimistically feel that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has been unsatisfactorily meeting its obligation to recover Mexican gray wolves by acquiescing to the obstinacy of the U.S. Forest Service. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has been effectively hampering, if not utterly defeating, the successful restoration of Mexican gray wolves by removing "problem" wolves from the reintroduced populations.

We strongly feel that the small number of ranchers who are privileged to use public lands for grazing cattle have an excessive amount of influence over the use of public lands, especially as said use affects recovery of threatened and endangered species. We pay taxes, too, and we do not appreciate that our taxes support cattle grazing on national forests in contradiction to recovery of threatened and endangered species. The U.S. Forest Service must get its priorities straight, and priority number one must be making decisions that promote the successful restoration of threatened and endangered species. Making a decision to prohibit cattle grazing on public lands critical for recovering threatened and endangered species would impact some ranchers, but to not exclude cattle grazing on the Apache and Gila national forests most likely means the extirpation, again, of Mexican gray wolves. We charge the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to fulfill its responsibility in enforcing the Endangered Species Act and in ensuring the successful restoration of Mexican gray wolves. We could stand to see and hear a few more wolves and a lot fewer cows on our public lands.

Dear Millsap,

As a supporter of scientifically sound wildlife management who understands the value wolves can bring to ecosystems, I am writing to urge you to take a more balanced approach to Mexican wolf recovery

efforts in the Southwest.

After ten years of reintroduction efforts, there are fewer than 60 wolves in the wild lands of the Southwest, more than 40 short of the reintroduction goal of establishing 102 wolves in the wild by 2006.

Mexican wolves are one of the most endangered animals in the world and play an important role in restoring balance to Southwest forests. But despite these facts, the Service hasn't made much progress in restoring them.

There are millions of acres of public land in the Southwest where wolves could thrive, but Mexican wolves continue to be confined to a much smaller, politically defined recovery area. The rules as they stand do not live up to the promise of the Endangered Species Act.

As one of 900,000 members and supporters of Defenders of Wildlife, I am asking you to make the following changes in the reintroduction rule.

First, "uplist" the Mexican wolf to Experimental Essential status. This will preserve the management flexibility of the rule, but require that other agencies consult about impacts on wolves.

Second, allow the wolves to disperse beyond the recovery area, and to be released where biologists say is best.

Third, don't limit wolf numbers, or allow any new reasons to kill them and ensure that any authorized removals take into account individual wolves' genetic value, the size and health of the population, the number of breeding pairs, and whether progress toward recovery is being made.

I am confident that if you make all of these changes, the Mexican gray wolf recovery program will get back on track and these wolves will have a real chance at recovery in the wild lands of the Southwest.
