Re: Mexican Grey Wolf NEPA Scoping

My name is Douglas Treadway and I wish to have my comments included in the Mexican Grey Wolf NEPA Scoping Process. I reside in Rio Arriba County near Chama, NM. My mailing address is POB 831, Tierra Amarilla, NM 87575.

I strongly support the reintroduction of the Mexican Grey Wolf in the southwest. However, this recovery program is in shambles! Partly because of the way USFWS has managed the reintroduction efforts, but also due to the attitudes of livestock interests and locals in places like Catron County.

It does not take a genius to realize that certain livestock management practices by some ranchers have invited occasional losses to wolves. Maybe some of these ill-advised practices have been accidental. However, I would be willing to bet my retirement that most of these activities have been intentionally perpetrated to entice wolves into uncompromising situations. When this program was initiated in the late 1990's, I was employed by a federal agency in New Mexico that worked closely with agricultural producers. One of my co-workers who

lived near Detil and shared the same anti-wolf sentiments of most folks in Catron County, stated "the locals will do whatever it takes to make this damn wolf program fail". His words were certainly prophetic.

If this worthy program is to succeed, and I believe it should be given every chance to be successful, the program needs to take a new approach — both administratively and philosophically. Our relationship with nature must be guided by long-sighted principles. When decisions about the land are only governed by self-interests, economics, and political intervention, destruction of the resource base generally follows. Human activities have wrought more damage on the land than wolves and other predators ever could. No one is saying that livestock can not graze on public lands; the reality is more folks want to see wolves restored to our public lands. It makes good ecological sense.

My proposal to enhance the program's future comprises the following twelve recommendations:

- 1) Suspend excessive killing and removal of wolves by federal agents;
- 2) Mandate that ranchers remove all livestock carcasses from public lands;
- 3) Employ an intensive educational program about the positive roles predators play;

- 4) Enlarge the size of the wolf recovery area to include remote wilderness areas in New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado;
- 5) Eliminate the political arbitrary boundary restrictions affecting how far wolves can roam;
- 6) Revoke grazing leases on public lands for any individual(s) responsible for killing, harassing or baiting wolves;
- 7) Increase the number of personnel who patrol public lands to watch dog would-be poachers and wolf antagonists;
- 8) Enlist the help of qualified and sympathetic individuals to assist with recovery efforts (like any federal agency the USFWS budget is strained);
- 9) Increase the compensation paid to ranchers for any livestock actually lost to wolves;
- 10) Establish collaborative working agreements with large land owners who would support wolves on their properties;
- 11) Punish those individuals who employ vigilante tactics to subvert the intent of the Endangered Species Act program — they are no better than eco-terrorists guilty of arson or destruction of property;
- 12) Assign an individual to direct the wolf recovery program whose commitment, energy, principles and vision are unwavering.

These recommendations will certainly not find favor in all circles, but the program's current direction and leadership are not getting it done. The last word in ignorance is the

person who denies the worth of something without really knowing anything about it. Despite efforts to preserve the species, the wolf's reputation has been mythically sabotaged by the likes of Little Red Riding Hood, greed and public hysteria. Though it be a slim one, we still have a chance to restore some of our southwestern ecosystems to a healthy balance. That will only happen if the wolf is given the opportunity to reestablish itself as a viable predator to help manage the system. For the sake of the land, it would be a shame to fail.

Dear Sir:

I wish to comment on the Mexican Wolf recovery program.

I believe that it is most unfortunate for these wolves because of the situation they are being forced into. Having been raised and fed in captivity and then dumped out in the forest is a bad situation for them at least, and downright cruelty at most. Feeding them from trucks, pack animals or helicopter or by what ever means simply complicates an already bad situation. A number of my friends have seen them in the wild and every wolf has wanted to get close to a pick up and even follow, I assume looking for a hand out. They are habituated to humans to the point of their own destruction.

Comming into areas with vehicle traffic they are being run over like skunks, bawling deer and others by accident. The fact that they look much like coyotes puts them in harms way during hunting and trapping season and virtually all year round, when unsuspecting hunters shoot at them. By their own nature they are going to stray into areas where they are in mortal danger.

Putting wolves in the wilderness area will never work. Unfortunately, because of over management, the wilderness is a semi sterile environment with little animal life and not enough pray. In Trabelling the wilderness area, most of it will yield a sighting of an occasional chip monk or raven, but the abundance of deer and elk. Over vegetation of woody plants has forced the pray base out of most of the wild country where wolves could possibly survive. They have no choice but to migrate into areas where they will interact with humans. That of course means trouble - Both for wolves and humans. ~~L~~ Livestock depredation will be the definite

outcome.

These wolves, having been cared for by humans, are more stupid than actual wild wolves, but even they are smart enough to figure out that a fat cow or calf of the domestic kind is an easy meal. Easier than some of the other choices. There will never be a time when livestock kills will not be happening in fairly significant numbers. It is not an acquired taste, it is an easier meal.

From the beginning of the wolf recovery program there was a false premise; that of significant prey base in the original release area. I have 50 years of experience in the area on the New Mexico side of the original release area. 50 years ago Deer were abundant. Herds of 30 animals were not uncommon. Driving across mesas near there at night was a sight to behold with numbers of 50 or more animals out feeding. By the time the wolves were released, there were no where ~~not~~ those numbers any more. You would be lucky

to see any deer while crossing the same area at night. Being an avid hunter, I can tell you hunting success rates may be single digit% of what they were 50 years ago. There are already too many predators in the recovery areas.

The deer herd has been reduced to the point that recovering to historic numbers is doubtful if not impossible. Part of that is over hunting, but regardless of the reason, that is where we are and another predator will only insure further demise of the deer herd. USF&W seems to be on a course of single species management without regard for others and this has never been beneficial to the area and never will.

Because of the wolf situation the economy of the area has suffered greatly and will continue to do so. The idea that great numbers of people will visit these areas to see or hear wolves has not proven to be the case and I believe will never be the case. To suppose that these visitors will take the place of the losses to hunting and livestock grazing is

pure fantasy. For Grant county the grazing industry is a major factor in the health of the county. For Catron County, Grazing is the number one industry. Damage being done to these ranches cannot be calculated but it is immense. For every animal confirmed killed by wolves there could as many as 20 or more that can't be confirmed. Who will replace that loss of income to those business and eventually to the county? Eventually hunting will diminish to a non factor in the economics of the affected counties. That is more hardship for all the residents. It represents untold numbers of dollars to all involved. This does not even address the problem of wear and tear on humans and equipment to deal with the problems of wolves invading people's lives. Many more hard earned dollars being spent on hours of checking on animals trying to keep them safe. Many hours of non productive time on horse back, vehicles or on foot, which could be spent on positive projects. Many lost hours of sleep and stressful days trying to understand

how to overcome the losses being heaped on normally tranquil activities. The cost to human health is incalculable but it is great.

Putting decent hard working people in a situation whereby they may encounter a wolf attack on a beloved pet is probably one of the cruellest flaws of the program. To chose between shooting a wolf and facing large fines and jail time, or watching a pet be maimed or killed is unacceptable. Many regard beloved pets as much as friends and relatives. There will be more pets killed and there will be more people against the program if this is not remedied.

Protecting pets whether dogs, cats, horses or a pet pig or goat is extremely important but of more importance are people. There will be human attacks by wolves. It is inevitable. Wolves are very habituated to humans because of the practices being employed. Human raised, Human fed in the wild. Wolves are drawn to human occupied areas and recognize humans

as well as their sounds and smells and come to them for food and probably comfort. Whether that food is a cow or calf or poodle or barn cat or a road kill elk thrown out of a pick up. They are drawn to it. There is no way to stop that without a change.

As you know, the program is in somewhat of a chaotic state with all the controversy and problems controlling the wolves. They will never be totally controlled but changes could be made to alleviate some of the problems and I will list a few of the most important:

- ① problem wolves must be removed more quickly to prevent a lethal take. It is not fair to the people being affected, and it is not fair to the wolf who is just being a wolf.
- ② allow pet owners or protectors to defend their animals by what ever means possible. use non lethal means if possible but have the option of a lethal take if necessary, without punishment.
- ③ Implement a more fair system to pay for livestock losses. Its obvious to

everyone that livestock owners are suffering a tremendous loss, much more than they are compensated for. It is possible to give a much better estimate of loss if someone really wanted to do it. Ranchers would not be against the program nearly as much if they were being treated fairly. The program would have a much better chance of acceptance if business were not asked to donate so much of their property through depredations.

- ④ Closely monitor Game populations in a fair and truthful manner. If predictions are correct and the number of wolves reach the maximum number, the elk population will go the way of the deer and the program will fail.
- ⑤ The most important of all and this is part of what I listed as number ①. Do not allow continual human/wolf contact. Do not feed wolves. Remove wolves that hang around or follow people. React more quickly to these close encounters

and train wolves that people are harmful to them. Create a special harassment team to find these wolves and punish them. Rubber bullets, paint balls or something must be used to make these animals truly wild. Human interaction will eventually kill this program.

And God help you the day one of your wolves kill a child.

Clearly the Wolf Recovery Program isn't working, either for the wolf or for residents in the recovery area. The Wolf Team spends an inordinate amount of time responding to incidents with "nuisance wolves." I propose the following changes in the wolf program.

- Expand the non-essential population area to include the entire state of Arizona and New Mexico. This will provide management flexibility to FWS to respond to conflicts between wolves and humans.
- Remove the requirement that FWS remove wolves that have established home ranges outside the recovery area. This will allow wolves that are not creating conflicts to remain.
- Expand the recovery area to include additional public lands (National Forests - Sitgreaves, Tonto, Prescott, Coronado, Kaibab, Cibola and possibly the Lincoln) (Appropriated BLM, FWS refuges, National Parks - Grand Canyon for instance, and state land to link forests) (include White Sands as part of recovery area), and large tracts of private and tribal lands where land owners agree.
- Allow initial release of wolves to occur anywhere within the recovery area. FWS personnel can be expected to choose the locations that would provide the best opportunity for wolves while minimizing likelihood of conflict with recovery area residents.
- Provide incentives to public lands permittees and residents within the recovery area to change livestock management and lifestyles to minimize conflicts with wolves.
- Change the reimbursement program to focus more on those cases where a wolf pack is making significant intrusions

in a local area (1-2 permittees) rather than paying for the occasional loss. Consider a threshold of loss that would trigger a higher level of reimbursement.

- Provide more tools for residents within the recovery area to use to dissuade wolves from "hanging around" private land, hunting camps, and livestock concentrations. This should include use of potentially harmful methods on private land—i.e. rocks, paintballs, rubber bullets, striking with whips or sticks. Wolves are pretty smart, they will learn to avoid areas where they are not wanted.
- Allow lethal take by private landowners on private land when wolves are chasing or attacking any domestic animal—pets, poultry, livestock. This may cause some loss of wolves but it is likely that remaining animals will avoid private land and humans.
- Allow FWS to permit residents in recovery area additional actions at FWS discretion.
- Change threshold for permanent removal of wolves from the wild. Consider "raising the bar" for permanent removal concurrent with "lowering the bar" for reimbursement of livestock operators.
- Continue to allow FWS the discretion to decide whether livestock carcasses require removal. Do not further burden public land livestock grazing permittees with unrealistic and unnecessary requirements.
- Regarding the Center for Biodiversity petition items: Permittees should be encouraged (through positive incentive program) to gradually change from year-round calving to spring calving. In those

two situations where a permittee's private land and/or allotment provide an opportunity, permittees should be encouraged to calve in a relatively confined situation. This opportunity is limited due to the need to provide rest and recovery for pastures used for spring calving ~~and~~ and to avoid repeated use of a pasture at the same time every year. It is also not feasible for most ranchers to convert from year-round use of public lands to seasonal use only because they lack sufficient private lands as capital to lease private lands sufficient to graze livestock for the part of the year they would need to be off public lands.

- Improve public land and mitigation of wolf activity

I suggest that with the success of the capture breeding program, it would be better to sacrifice a few released wolves through broadening the permission for private landowners to take wolves with the expectation that wolves remaining in the population will learn to avoid mankind and become ~~as~~ as elusive as coyotes are now. I suggest that expanding both the experimental non-essential population area and the recovery area and allowing release of wolves anywhere within the recovery area will provide a better chance of establishing a viable population. Support for the wolf recovery program by those who reside within the recovery area will be improved through a combination of education, improved communication and empowerment to protect domestic livestock -

RE: Comments regarding identification of direct, indirect and adverse effects that might be caused by amendment of the 1998 NEP final rule that established the current NEP of Mexican gray wolf.

Dear Sirs:

I am commenting on the disproportionately high and adverse impacts on minority and low income populations which would follow expansion of the wolf population and its boundaries. I am concerned with the protocol for compensation to livestock producers in western New Mexico and eastern Arizona. Clearly, compensation for losses is neither timely nor fair.

As boundaries for the wolf expand and surround communities and villages eastward, the losses to the aforementioned populations will be oppressive. The wolf program is not at the level of sophistication where a proper equitable compensatory attitude exists within the camp of wolf supporters. In a setting where numerous small operators/growers rely on monthly or quarterly harvest of livestock for food, wolf predation creates hardship especially during winter months and specifically for widows and/or retirees living on fixed incomes.

Rural communities and villages continue to demonstrate the survivability of the extended family structure within land based economies. A part of that structure is the matanza (slaughter event). The frequency and scale of various matanzas during the year depend on numerous family and/or religious celebrations or gatherings. This cultural behavior will continue and eventually collide with the wolf program.

There will be those who suffer incarceration as a result of shooting wolves. There will be those who shoot wolves and do not get caught. Either way, wolves will be caught in a bind between rural New Mexicans and a federal program with no institutional memory for problem solving of this nature. Unintended consequences of the wolf program and its shortcomings

mighty hand of federal law. No doubt, the federal government already has clearly demonstrated how to suppress property rights. Additionally, the wolf program does not reflect positively within the context of the endangered species act and without successful implementation inhibits the credibility of the endangered species act.

Finally, the wolf program is in need of critical input from all facets of the rural areas within the proposed boundaries. How will that input occur? Those who would eliminate the wolf are protecting their capability to survive by protecting a culture.

Dear Mr. Millsap,

I would like for you to consider the following comments regarding the proposed amendment of the rule establishing a Non Essential Experimental Population of the Arizona and New Mexico Population of the Mexican Gray Wolf.

- ① Current boundaries need to be left as they are. The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service need to demonstrate the ability to deal with problems created by Wolf Reintroduction in the current boundaries before expanding those boundaries.
- ② The practice of feeding wolves should be stopped. This only leads to more habituated wolves.
- ③ Wolves ~~should~~ should be removed immediately after their first livestock depredation. It has already been shown that once a wolf kills livestock it will continue to do so.
- ④ Carcass removal by livestock operators on public land should not be required. Public and private land in many parts of the Wolf Recovery Area are mingled. The U.S. Fish & Wildlife cannot make the same

requirements of private land operators. Therefore there is no benefit in keeping wolves from scavenging dead carcasses on public land. Further imagine the task of digging a hole deep enough to cover a 1000 pound animal in an area where topsoil may be less than a foot deep. If the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service believes carcass removal would benefit the Wolf Recovery Program then they should provide the labor and financial resources for carcass removal not the livestock operator.

- ⑤ Livestock operators need to be compensated for all wolf kills. For this to happen current methods of determining a wolf kill must be changed. In other wolf recovery areas in the United States missing calves are counted as confirmed or probable kills as long as there is wolf scat with calf hair in it nearby. That should also be ~~the~~ one of the standards for determining a wolf kill in New Mexico and Arizona.

Dear Sir:

I am writing as someone who has worked for the reintroduction and recovery of the Mexican wolf for 20 years or so. I find the present system of limiting their territory and the continual harassment and killing deeply troubling.

It is time for Fish and Wildlife to start following their own science. The lobo is an endangered species on public land and should be treated as such - it is time to stop bowing to the commercial interests of a privileged few (public lands ranchers), and give the wolf a real chance.

First off - wolves should be allowed to go where they will - expand their territory and make sure they are protected. Release more wolves in a wider area, especially in the Gila Wilderness, Aldo Leopold, Apache Kid, etc.

Stop the constant harrassing and killing of wolves - your own science shows that wild-raised wolves have better survival rates and skills, so stop rounding up offending wolves, at least until a viable population is established.

Ranchers should be reimbursed for livestock taken but should be required to remove or render inedible dead stock.

It seems FWS keeps this program in a state of flux, redesigning it as if they want it to fail. Allow the Lobos to regain a stable population, then remove trouble-makers. It is no wonder the number of Mexican Gray wolves in the wild remains so low, between relearning the ways of survival, a dedicated few determined to kill them illegally, and a federal program designed to restrict and harass them endlessly.
