- The following are comments regarding the scoping process for the Mexican Gray Wolf:
- 1) We were not able to attend the public meetings in Nov. or Dec., so the following are written comments regarding the Mexican Gray Wolf Program & proposals.
 - 2) We are a citizen group in rural TAOS County, New Mexico and are concerned with healthy native wildlife populations in New Mexico.
 - 3) It is critical that there be changes made by the USFWS in its' management of the wolf in NM & AZ. We do not support further lethal takes of the wolf, nor removal of packs, esp. with family groups.
 - 4) More needs to be done to work →

with local ranchers & livestock
growers to reduce conflicts.
There needs to be monitoring of
problem allotments (esp. on public
lands), and requirements to move
any dead livestock immediately;
also - important to have any calving
or lambing done on private ranches -
not on wild lands in wolf reintro-
duction areas.

This would reduce predation and
conflicts greatly, and give wolves a
greater chance of survival; ~~survival~~
5) Livestock permits should also have
fug-out incentives if they are in
wilderness areas, or areas of high wolf
quality habitat.

b) We support Gov. Richardson's call
for restraint on lethal take & removal
of wolves and urge the USFWS to
correct weaknesses of past manage-
ment & work towards greater
protection of the Mexican wolf in NM



I can understand some of their concerns regarding wolf reintroduction. But that does not change the law.

I have been an avid supporter of lobo reintroduction since the inception of the program. I understand that you & your staff are under harsh & conflicting pressures from various groups both for & against the program. But with all due respect, the USFWS has done a poor job. The wolves have been set-up. How can they possibly propagate & live as wolves with all of the constraints & restrictions placed upon them? It borders on absurd. If we are going to reintroduce them it seems we need to make conditions & regulations which will enable that to occur.

We all know the local policies of "shoot, shoot & shut-up" - its common knowledge

that occurs - especially in Catron Co.

Why aren't these folks dealt with more seriously? And if that's not bad enough, your agency is trapping, relocating + further confusing the wolves (if not outright harming them).

I apologize for the caustic nature of my remarks. I repeat, I understand there are many factors involved.

But laws were passed mandating lobo reintroduction, laws that we now see won't exactly work as planned. I encourage your agency to change whatever is not working to enable the success of this program + I applaud anything you can do to help the realistic recovery of the Mexican Gray Wolf in the Northwest.



Dear Mr. M. Isap,

I am writing because I am too... so concerned w/ the
surviving of the Mexican wolf. It has become apparent that
these animals will deteriorate in number if we do not intervene.
That is why I urge you to help put a halt to the removal
of wolves from the wild at least until the population increases
and their "status" is far from extinction. Extinction can also be
prevented if the Mexican wolf recovery plan is updated to include
new science and numerical targets. The current plan hasn't been
revised since 1982; this is before the discipline of conservation biology
envisaged. Science is a wonderful thing, and it is up to the
recovery of a species to continue our success. I realize that
many people see wolves as blood-thirsty savages and that this
misconception often keeps them from taking the necessary precautions
to protect the species from extinction. However, I believe this problem
is one of the easiest to resolve. The implementation of fact-based
education programs about wolves would help people better
understand the animals' situation. Once a new perspective is
spread across the population, it will be easier to get people to
help address and resolve the problem at hand. It would be
particularly beneficial to educate ranchers and communities

within the wolf recovery area. This would make it easier to resolve livestock-wolf conflicts; ranchers aware of the problem would be willing to relocate their livestock operations to wolf-free areas. In order for this to happen, a voluntary grazing retirement program would have to be initiated to give farmers the actual option to relocate. I realize that not all of my suggestions can be enforced instantly; however, I do acknowledge that action must be taken soon if this species of Mexican wolves is to be preserved. I implore you for your help - The Mexican wolf needs you! Thank you for your time.

So I believe it would be way better since the mexican wolves are almost extinct. And they are such beautiful animals. So lets save them with anything we can do.


